
What would you do?

 - -given by a vet





- risks to
 - -trade
 - -animal welfare
 - -agricultural security
 - -public health
- · efficacy???





- all drugs used in animals must be registered unless
 - -exempted under ACVM Regs
 - -a s28 code of practice is followed
 - conditions can be applied to registration
 - -RVMs (PARs)
 - -species



must be authorised by vet

-can be given by anyone

· can be restrictions on use

-must be given by vet

-must be used only under an approved plan

- s28 codes of practice
 - -NZVA code of practice
 - human prescription drugs
 - -prescription writing standard





exempted with conditions

-human GSL drugs

-shampoos, hoof treatments etc

–drugs compounded by a vet for animals under his care

-substances generally recognised as safe



- separate prescribing from dispensing
- allow prescribing over the phone without examining animal
- relax PAR classification
 - -standing orders (veterinary operating instructions)

- ERMA
- manages risk to
 - -environment
 - -public health
- definitions?



HSNO Act

- new organisms
 - -genetically modified
 - -exotic animals / plants
 - -newly evolved pathogens???
- hazardous substances
 - anything which may be detrimental to human health or the environment

HSNO Act

 detailed regs listing hazardous substances and conditions

-active ingredients not trade name

products

 vet drugs are hazardous substances

human drugs are exempt

HSNO Amendment

- sets thresholds
 - -above threshold full approval process
 - -below threshold ACVM Group or Medsafe can approve

food standards

medicines classification

- prescription medicine
- restricted medicine
- pharmacy only medicine
- · · (general sales medicine)



Medicine

 anything for administration to people for a therapeutic purpose (treating or preventing disease, diagnosing disease, contraception, inducing anaesthesia, altering the human body, interfering with physiological functions or cleaning contact lenses) or for pregnancy testing. Does not include animal remedies.

New medicine

-any medicine which has not been generally available in NZ in the last five years.

Pharmacy only medicine

-declared by regulation or notice that may only be sold in a pharmacy or hospital, or a licensed shop.

Prescription medicine

 declared by regulation or notice that may only be sold pursuant to a prescription written by a practitioner or veterinary

surgeon.

- Restricted medicine
 - -declared by regulation or notice that may only be sold only by a pharmacist in a pharmacy or hospital.
- (nb. drugs controlled under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1975 are not classified under this act.)

Medicines Act


- s25 vets may procure drugs for named patients
- s29 anyone may sell a vet a drug for a named patient?

Medicines Act

- in both Europe and USA,
 veterinary & human medicines are regulated under the same law
- · Oz different laws in each state
- drugs not licensed in NZ are often licensed overseas





- drugs of abuse
 - -classification
 - -records
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cd prescriptions

- same as medicine prescriptions but
 - -no abbreviations
 - -no repeats
 - -must be hand written
- only rarely necessary for class drugs in vet practice
